Abstract:

A collection of materials related to the Japanese Friendship Garden of San Diego including its initial planning and construction.

Biographical/Historical Notes:

The Japanese Friendship Garden of San Diego is located on a twelve acre plot in Balboa Park. It was first opened in 1991 after an extensive planning and fundraising campaign. The second phase, opened in 1999, was designed by renowned landscape architect Takeo Uesugi. This phase added the Exhibit Hall, Activity Center, and Koi Pond. The third phase, completed in 2015, comprised 9 additional acres which included a 200 cherry tree grove, large azalea and camellia garden, a water feature reminiscent of the San Diego watershed, and the state-of-the-art Inamori Pavilion.

The Garden is an expression of friendship between San Diego and its sister city, Yokohama that illustrates two cultures and creates an immersive experience into Japanese culture. The design is based on centuries-old Japanese techniques adapted to San Diego's climate and florae and seeks to foster a relationship between humans and nature, providing a respite attuned to Japanese simplicity, serenity, and aestheticism.

The mission of the Japanese Friendship Garden Society of San Diego is to develop a traditional Japanese garden as a center to educate, engage, and inspire people of diverse backgrounds about Japanese culture and community legacy. It currently offers a variety of educational programs, exhibits, and festivals as well as accredited horticultural classes to enhance and deepen visitor appreciation for Japanese culture. As a valued community resource, it is well known for its unique setting, stone arrangements, koi ponds, water features, sukiya-style buildings and landscape.

Scope and Content:

A collection of materials related to the Japanese Friendship Garden of San Diego including its initial planning and construction. It contains early planning documents and materials related to the creation of the Garden as well as legal documents including the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. There are also Board minutes, and information about various projects, programs and events. Of particular interest is the Light of Friendship project which saw a large bronze lantern (yukidoro) installed in the Garden. It was a gift from the Boy Scouts and the Citizens of Yokohama as a symbol of continued friendship between the two cities.
